We're thrilled to announce some exciting developments at Dawn House School! We've secured over £28k in funding from 'activenotts, Opening Schools Facilities' to fully furnish a new gym on site. This investment allows us to train five members of staff to become qualified gym instructors. Additionally, we will support a teaching assistant to earn her dance qualification, enabling us to offer dance as an extracurricular activity and eventually as an accredited award. A teacher is also being trained in netball to start a netball club. Plus, Mansfield Town Football Club will run an after-school club on Wednesdays from 3:30 - 5:00 pm, from Autumn term 2024 until the end of Spring term 2025. These fantastic advancements promise to enhance the educational and extracurricular experiences for all our pupils at Dawn House. This week...

Key Stage 4 residential trip to the Youth Hostel in Castleton.

A group of 11 pupils enjoyed the challenges of being away from school on a three-day, two-night residential experience in Losehill Youth Hostel just outside Castleton in the beautiful Peak District.

The residential trips provide an incredible opportunity for our pupils to experience time away from school and home whilst building independence, resilience, friendship skills and having fun and time with their peers. For many of our pupils the school residential trips can be the only occasion that pupils enjoy a "sleep over" with friends and have time away from their families.

We arrived at the Youth Hostel in time for a picnic in their gardens before we all set out to build shelters using some ropes are tarpaulins. Pupils worked well as teams communicating their designs band ideas, some fabulous shelters and all survived the rainstorm that poured out of a watering can! Pupils went on to make their own fires using a flint and steel to create a spark to ignite cotton



wool and build a fire from very small fine twigs with the goal to keep the fire burning for at least 5 minutes.

On the Tuesday the weather was unkind, with persistent heavy rain all morning. The pupils were brilliant in accepting the conditions as they prepared to climb over and then abseil down from a high bridge in Millers Dale; one or two pupils had no fear whilst others needed some gentle encouragement and support. The instructors who led the session were awesome in their knowledge and patience and commitment to ensuring our pupils had the best possible experience. Tuesday afternoon there was some respite from the rain and the whole group enjoyed weaselling on Higgar Tor. Pupils and staff enjoyed squeezing through gaps between huge rocks and boulders, this is a favourite activity and suitable for all, there was a real sense of achievement and fun. Before returning on Wednesday, pupils worked well in teams to problem solve through a range of team challenges. One such challenge was to move a tennis ball through small sections of guttering held by individual pupils across the field, this meant that the entire group had to work and communicate together - a simple but very effective team building challenge.

The residential trips give the pupils so many positive opportunities to develop and make lifelong memories, but this would not be possible without really committed, skilful staff teams which make the trips happen. A big thank you to the team and a huge well done to all the pupils who attended.
