Top three finalists in each group will receive the following prizes:



playing with friends. She describes how hard parents try to persuade and cajole children, get annoyed with them, with everything making matters worse.

Some children see all of these demands around them as a threat and feel pressured by all of these expectations.

We know, that the 'no' is a shield. It protects them but also can become a cage.
